



Face the Race is a seven-week mentoring program available to young ladies at all four Midland junior highs, which ends with the running (or walking) of the Face the Race 5K. During the program, mentors from the League and community volunteers covered many different topics including nutrition, women's health, different exercise programs, and self-defense. A typical session includes a snack, icebreaker, speaker on the week's topic, and a bit of training for the 5K.

All participants celebrated the end of the program on Monday November 12, 2018 with a party at their respective school. The girls were fed by Johnny's BBQ and created tutus in anticipation of the race. All the participants received gear for finishing the program which included a brand-new pair of running shoes, neon shoe laces, two Face the Race t-shirts, a pair of shorts, a sports bra, and a drawstring backpack.


On Saturday, November 17, 2018, the 11th Annual Face the Race 5k was held at the Junior League of Midland Headquarters. Participants included 84 junior high girls who had completed the program. Joining these young ladies were 54 League members, 23 Face the Race mentors, 4 coordinators, 2 chairmen, and 189 participants from the community.

Race day began with a simple online check-in and a hearty breakfast provided by Chick-fil-A and Gandy's. The participants were led to a glitter station which included several types of glitter, face paint, gloves, and head warmers for them to customize. A photo booth with props took their pictures before they lined up for the race. The DJ played a great warm-up mix and after an invocation led by Kimberly Reeves, the runners were off racing through Windlands Park next to League headquarters.

All junior high participants received a medal for finishing. One lucky young lady from each school was drawn to receive a Cinergy gift card. Top runners received Midland Athletic Company gift cards and medals.

Support of the community was crucial to Face the Race. MAKING AN IMPACT

Imagine meeting your girlfriends on your lunch hour for a quick meal and catch-up on your life events. What starts as simple chit-chat progresses into more vulnerable and deep conversation as the lunch continues. Relationships often form and grow over a shared meal, whether it is professional, familial, romantic, or platonic. The I.M.P.A.C.T (Inspiring Mindful Progress in Academics and Community Together) program utilizes the rapport established in sharing a meal to build a mentoring relationship with participants.

The I.M.P.A.C.T. program started at Midland Freshman High School in September of 2017 and has doubled in size since then. I.M.P.A.C.T is now at both Midland Freshman and Lee Freshman, the only two exclusively freshman high school campuses in Midland. The program has been connecting members of the Junior League of Midland with freshman female students over good food and conversation. As with any social gathering, the lunch provided to the participants not only motivates them to attend, but meets a physical need. On the first and third Tuesdays of every month from September to April, committee members meet at both campuses with participants. Each lunch period has an average attendance of 10-20 girls with 8-10 committee members present. In the spring, both I.M.P.A.C.T committees are lucky enough to add mentors from the Junior League's provisional class which helps to make the sessions more interactive for the mentees and gives the

Provisionals a chance to learn more about the Junior League's community placements.

A typical meeting starts with the lunch bell. Each school has two lunch periods, and we have committee members who serve girls during each lunch period. The girls rush into the classroom where the Committee meets every week, grab a plate of food, and take a seat to eat family style with their small group. During the first session, mentors are assigned a small group made up of three to five girls who they will consistently sit and meet with in a more personal setting throughout the course of the entire year. The Chairmen have found that meeting with the same group of girls from month to month builds great rapport early on, therefore fostering more meaningful relationships between the mentors and the girls. Each month, the committees focus on a different topic that is meaningful to freshman girls. The topics for this year include conversation etiquette, stress management, appropriate dress, substance abuse, bullying, healthy bodies, and cyber safety. Typically, there is a speaker who leads a group discussion during the first Tuesday of the month and then we continue to talk about the topic of the month amongst small groups during the following session that month.

Whether it is putting on a "What Not to Wear" Fashion Show or sharing vulnerable stories from our own lives, being an I.M.P.A.C.T. mentor has given us all the feelings! The girls

come from all walks of life: some are athletes, some are involved in zero extracurriculars, some come from broken homes, and some simply just need someone who they can confide in who will not judge them. The diversity within the small groups has allowed the mentors and the girls to learn from and relate to each other even though everyone seems so different on the outside.

It is no easy task to feed 60-80 hungry teenagers and the I.M.P.A.C.T. Committee could not provide this need without the help of our community. The Committee is so fortunate for the generosity of several League members as well as local restaurants who have provided food for all four lunch sessions between the two schools. Meals have ranged from sandwiches, to barbecue, to pizza (a favorite of course) but the message to the participants is the same: The League cares about you, wants to hear your story and also help you navigate the difficulties and hardships that ninth grade girls face.

The Junior League has seen and heard firsthand how I.M.P.A.C.T. has made a difference among freshman girls in the Midland community. The Committee has heard directly from the girls themselves about how helpful it is to have someone to talk on issues they feel they cannot talk about with anyone else. Parents have also approached committee members in public to let them know the changes they have seen in their children due to the mentorship of I.M.P.A.C.T. The Junior League is truly making an IMPACT at Midland and Lee Freshman.

Please tell us a little about your family.



As part of the League's year-long celebration of its 70 years of service in Midland, League members have been undertaking monthly service projects with various area nonprofits around the Permian Basin. In January, the League partnered with Gifts of Hope, Inc. Gifts of Hope is a nonprofit organization that was started to meet emotional and physical needs of cancer patients and family members of patients being treated at Allison Center in Midland or the West Texas Cancer Center in Odessa through Texas Oncology.

One of the great things that Gifts of Hope provides is Hope House, an eight-bedroom, eight-bathroom home which includes a self-serve pantry, living room, and library where patients and family members can stay during treatments. Many of the patients live in small communities within the Permian Basin and travel to Midland and Odessa for cancer treatment. This home away from home meets a huge need. The alternative would be a hotel, which can be costly and not nearly as private or accommodating to patients. Hope House is their refuge in an uncertain time.

On Saturday January 19, 2019, the Junior League of Midland worked with Gifts of Hope to update and refurbish the Hope House by providing new bedding, shower curtains, bath mats, and a few other accessories. Volunteers painted a few accent walls and rearranged furniture to help give the space a more updated, warmer feel.



This service project was funded in part by a generous donation of home goods and linens from Target.
